I would like to thank Sjoerd and Liz for all their hard work on behalf of the community and Parish Council over the years. We wish them well in their new home. I would also like to thank Alison for her continued updates regarding the Shopwhyke area.

Alan Smith has been co-opted as a Parish Councillor we welcome him back to the Parish Council. We still have space for three new councillors and would love to hear from anyone who would be interested in helping to manage the Parish, particularly those living outside Oving village as it is a very large and spread out Parish.


We would also like to thank everyone for looking out for each other during the pandemic. It was and is a most unusual time and we would like to thank everyone for doing their bit.

We would like to welcome our dedicated Police Community Support Officer, Richard Moorey, who many of you will know was previously our PCSO for many years prior to the change away from regional dedicated PCSOs.

The Oving Parish Council has been unable to hold an AGM this year due to Covid-19, but we have decided to go ahead with an Oving Parish Neighbourhood Plan. There is a separate committee that has formed, and we will be consulting primarily through the Oving Community website and mailchimp so please sign up for notifications on the website. Our Parish is increasing in its number of residents and a plan to help new and current residents get as much benefit out of development as possible is key to managing the most significant change to the Parish since the A27 by-pass.

Chichester District Council have produced their latest Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment, and this has been done under new rules from Central Government. The new rules mean that CDC have to assess land put forward for development assuming that there was no local plan or neighbourhood plan in place. This does **not** mean that the areas identified as being capable of development, will be developed. However, for Oving Parish it does highlight the long-term issue that we will face. With climate change potentially meaning that some proposed housing development along the coast will not be able to go ahead the pressure will be on inland areas that are not in a flood zone or the South Downs National Park for future housing development.

The map on the next page shows the area within the Parish that has been assessed.



The three main areas that I feel were not accurately assessed were

- 1.The last underground water route from the downs to the coast around Chichester and the need for it to prevent flooding elsewhere.
- 2.The lack of safeguarding the Wildlife corridor from Downs to coast as identified in CDC's Local Plan Review
- 3. The lack of protection to the setting of Oving Village conservation area.

I also think their plan should have had a different colour scheme for each of the different ways in which land was assessed depending on which 'Round' they were assessed under.

There will soon be some white gate markers at various points throughout the Parish that will help drivers visually realise they are coming up to a neighbourhood. The most effective means of controlling speeding in our communities is through Speedwatch (a great example is the one in Boxgrove). If anyone is interested in forming a group to do this, they would have Parish Council support.

As the arrival of vaccines moves us towards the end of Covid restrictions, the full extent of the economic impact will start to be felt. For both residents and businesses there is a wide range of support available, but as always the difficulty is joining up that support to those who need it. For individuals and families, the extensive community support network that has grown up over the year complements the advice available from WSCC's Community Hub (03302 227 980). Covid will have a relatively short, but intense, impact. A more permanent change will arise from new development along the A27 corridor. Given the area East of Chichester City is less



environmentally constrained than that around the Harbours and that next to the National Park, it is going to be the focus of a large amount of new building.

This represents a historic change in the local landscape as new development moves beyond the former gravel workings. The challenge is how can, or is, it to be managed and made socially, environmentally and economically sustainable. These are issues that the Local Plan Review process is grappling with, not least of which is transport.

Is this true???

Three Americans were caught boiling chickens in one of Yellowstone National Park's hot springs. The trio had hiked to the Shoshone Geyser Basin before dipping two raw chickens, placed in a sack, into the boiling water to cook them. When caught they said they had read the park's regulations, which prohibits throwing rocks and other items in, but made no mention of chickens.

Two were jailed for two days and fined \$540 and the other fined \$1250. All three were banned from the park for two years !!!

FILM REVIEW The Trial of the Chicago 7 (released on Netflix 2020)

Directed by Aaron Sorkin

Set in 1969, this film recounts the true story of the trial of 7 activists charged with incitement to cause rioting during the Democratic National Convention in Chicago in 1968. Set at the time of America's Vietnam War, it recounts the activities of 3 major disparate groups seeking to highlight the insanity of the war and to protest peacefully to stop the war.

The groups consisted of the "SDS" (Students for a Democratic Society) led by Tom Hayden, played by Eddie Redmayne; the" Yippies" (members of the Youth International party) led by Abbie Hoffman played by Sacha Baron Cohen; and The Black Panther Movement, (a civil rights movement for US African Americans) led by Bobby Seale, played by Yahya Abdul-Mateen II. He is actually the 8th accused, and not represented by the lawyer representing the others. His lawyer cannot attend due to health issues, but the judge has refused to delay the trial. He is the only black defendant. His treatment in court is so prejudicial that he is acquitted by mistrial.

The film moves back and forth in time, chronicling the back stories of the activists and highlighting their very different approaches under the Stop the War banner, as well as clearly showing that until their arrest, they had no connection with each other.

The bulk of the film is set in the courtroom, and it is a tense, exasperating and sometimes funny narrative. It also does not stray from the fundamental reason for the peaceful protests that led to the Police's actions on the day, and the final court room scene nails that home.

Judge Hoffman, played by Frank Langella, is clearly biased in support of the State prosecutors, and plays fast and loose with the law, admissible evidence and the issue of Bobby Seale having no representation in court. Mark Rylance plays William Kunstler the defence attorney for the 7, with a dire comb-over and oversized suit, he seems under prepared for the slick prosecution's case. Ah but looks can be deceptive, and with the help of the Judge's increasingly bizarre pronouncements, it becomes clear to all that the case is not a criminal one, but a politically motivated vexatious case which is determined to convict these men on the grounds of their antipathy to the war, rather than that they conspired to commit acts of violence.

This film is as apt today as in the 1960's, especially on the coat tails of the recent US election debacle and the race riots that have followed the death of George Floyd. As Karl Marx said "History repeats itself, first as tragedy, then as farce" Do see it in the comfort of your own home, as it is brilliantly acted, funny, poignant, and a reminder of the power of unified action when the goal is undisputedly for the protection of mankind.



Please place your books on the shelves and if there is no space maybe a charity shop will take them when they reopen or the 'Nextdoor Oving' website has a 'For Sale and Free' section.

And please do not leave your empty drinks cans and rubbish for others to clear away.

It should be really easy to keep this well used village facility running efficiently between us for the duration (other village phone box libraries have been, and remain, closed). We just all need to take a bit more care. I'm sorry if this sounds like more whinging and restrictions but it needs to be said if we want to retain this popular facility!

V J Day 75th Anniversary Celebration, 15th August 2020

Victory over Japan day was celebrated on the 15th August 1945 and marked the end of WW11. On this day in 1945 Emperor Hirohito announced Japans acceptance of the Potsdam Declaration and in effect defeat. The formal surrender came later on September the 2nd aboard battleship USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay.

We are grateful to Chris for sharing these pictures of her Dad and I am sure all will agree, she has provided a fitting tribute to remind us of the many who suffered so terribly at the hands of the Japanese Imperial Army.










BOOK CLUB REPORT

By coincidence our first two choices for Autumn were both murder mysteries – but so different. Ann Cleeves is the creator of detectives Vera and Jimmy Perez. In "The Long Call" she introduces her readers to a new detective based in North Devon. Venn is quiet and introspective, but he has the courage to live openly with his partner Jonathan, who runs a centre for the disadvantaged. Much of the novel's action takes place there.



A very different setting is Amir Mukherjee's "A Rising Man". We are in the steamy heat of Calcutta in the early 1920's. Sam Wyndham has left the horror of the trenches and his wife's death in the 1919 flu epidemic to become a police Captain in India. His sergeant is known as Surrender-Not because the British cannot pronounce his Indian name properly. He is an excellent character; the two men come to like and trust each other. At the beginning of both novels a man's body is found, and from that point we have two well crafted stories, where the psychology of the different personalities is as important as the plot. I am not going to divulge the plots, just say that all our members thoroughly enjoyed and recommend these books.

Not so with "Munich" by Robert Harris. There were reservations from some of us, who thought it too slow to develop. The book's factual background concerns the meetings in September 1938between Chamberlain and Hitler, from which the Prime Minister returned saying he had secured "peace in our time", (Ha! Ha!). The fictional story presents two diplomats: Hugh Legat with Chamberlain, Paul Hartmann in Germany. They knew each other at Oxford years before. Hartmann (who hates Hitler) wants to give Legat a secret document showing that Hitler's real purpose is war. It has taken a long time to arrive at this point so the excitement of danger and secrecy seems too rushed. But other members did appreciate the slow unwinding of historic events.

We have yet to discuss "Middle England" by Jonathan Coe who said he intended to write "a comic novel about Brexit". Well yes, but it is much more. An extended family and their friends represent attitudes to life in modern England. The elderly long for "the Good Old Days" (whatever they were). The disenchanted young fulminate against all politics. There are racists and liberals, those pro or anti Brexit, dreams and reality. The narrative is by turns funny, ironic, witty, sad. It offers much food for thought and will provoke an interesting discussion, I am sure.

My Favourite Local Walk reflections from Ann Jenkins

Being a Scot and a Munro bagger in my younger days, I ignored the Downs on my doorstep for most of the eighteen years I have lived here – who wanted to hike up what I could not even bring myself to describe as hills! Lockdown forced me to walk more or less from my door though, and what do you know, I find that these Downs are actually quite nice and even afford a decent view or two too. OK, I may never need my ice axe, but I can get a good stretch of the legs and stunning scenery frequently unfolds from their tops.

My current favourite is probably Kingley Vale. Parking at West Stoke, the walk up through the atmospheric cathedrals of ancient yew is as gorgeous a start to a walk as you will find. You'll encounter an abundance of wildlife and wild flowers on the walk up and, once you hit the top, a breathtaking view stretches out all around you. The whole of Chichester Harbour lies at your feet and you can see mile after glorious mile of the South Coast. The circular walk is just over 7km, so, ignoring photo-op stops, should take not much more than an hour and a half, so get out there and fill your lungs!

- 2. Cut off the drumsticks. or the whole legs, to freeze for delicious small roasts.
- 3. Carefully remove both the breast fillets and roast the main carcass **upside down** leaving you with the dark meat from the legs, and the wings. Some people think the dark meat is the most succulent.

Whatever you remove wrap well in film and then a freezer bag, label and freeze as soon as possible

Now what about all that delicious left-over turkey – if you cook a really large one? Try some of these ideas:-

- 1 <u>Stir fry cut</u> into thin strips and marinade in Hoisin, chilli & soy, or one of the many stir fry sauces. Stir fry a selection of colourful veg cut to similar sizes with grated garlic, root ginger and chilli (optional). Stir in the turkey and marinade when veg are almost ready, just to heat through thoroughly for the last few minutes. Finish with a splash of soy sauce
- 2 <u>Sandwiches -Toasted or not</u>: are quickly made. Add crispness from shredded leaves; succulence from mayonnaise, a favourite sauce or chutney, mashed avocado or hummous; add piquancy with a drizzle of chilli oil or a sharp salad dressing and good thick slices of turkey breast in the middle!
- 3 <u>Salads</u> chop the meat into small chunks and toss into a varied salad with crisp leaves and watercress as the base, then add some interesting ingredients like cooked bacon, avocado, crisp pears, apples or mango and top with salted almonds and a fruity dressing passion fruit or chilli and lime or mango. Very refreshing for Boxing Day.
- 4 <u>Stir into</u> a pasta dish with a rich tomato and herb sauce. Add to a risotto with peas, asparagus, and green beans.



NEWS FROM YOUR VILLAGE HALL

How lovely it was to re-open the Hall in September and welcome back our regular users after lockdown and finally, after five months, have some income again. Didn't last long though with the second lockdown meaning we are back to an unused Hall in November and no income.

We are fortunate that we have loyal regular users and we had two new users with a History of Art Group and Evangelical Community recently joining our regulars. All of them are hoping to be back as soon as they can although unlikely until January. We can only hope that there will not a third lockdown. As a Management Committee we are so saddened to see the years of hard work promoting the Hall and increasing our income so that we were feeling more financially robust to now see that security gradually being eroded. We were fortunate to benefit from a grant from Chichester District Council for the first period of lockdown and we are exploring possible support for this second period.

In the meantime our caretakers continue to look after the Hall making sure it is secure, aired and serviced ready to be opened again with whatever restrictions might be in place. Our booking secretary is still dealing with queries for the future and working with brides and grooms who have booked weddings, postponed them and wait nervously for confirmation that they will be able to go ahead in 2021.

On a positive note OPC has secured a grant for us to have a new boiler which will complete the major works on the Hall. It would make so much sense to be able to have had it installed during a lockdown but the news of the award came too late to get the work done in November.

Another development will be two new signs at the entrance to the Hall to make us more visible to people passing through the village or coming to the Hall. These have been manufactured and fitted by M&J Engineering based at the Woodhorn Business Centre.

Between lockdowns, we managed to have a suitably distanced and masked AGM and Quarter 2 meeting. All the existing committee members have continued as trustees and we welcomed Anne-Marie Eastwood as a new trustee.

We look forward to 2021 with fingers crossed that regulars, villagers, parties and weddings will be filling our Hall again. In the meantime don't forget if you live in Oving Parish you get a discounted hire rate for use of both the meeting room and the main hall.




