This is to update you on where we are with this project.

Overall we have made steady progress. We have done the first draft of the policy ideas for each of the five topics and we have commissioned consultants to turn these ideas into policies that can be used in determining planning applications.

We have used other consultants to prepare a set of design guidelines covering for example density and height of buildings, building materials, car parking, creating green spaces, pedestrian and cycle paths. These could be used for large developments of the kind anticipated at Shopwyke and for smaller schemes elsewhere in the parish.

We had hoped to have a draft plan to put to residents this autumn. That was ambitious. It's not just a matter of drafting the policies. We have also to ask CDC to screen whether once adopted they could have any significant effect on the environment and/ or wildlife habitats. We don't expect that to be the case but the assessment would take weeks.

Our best estimate for consulting the parish including landowners and employers, residents and statutory consultees is now the first quarter of 2022.

From Simon Oakley

Our WSCC/ CDC Councillor

Over the summer, we have seen at home and overseas the impacts of intense rainfall events. Given climate change forecasts, it brings into sharp relief the need for existing drainage infrastructure to be maintained, restored and improved. New development is required to deal with, on-site, 1:100 year plus up to 40% climate change allowance storm events (taking into account groundwater levels). Little of our existing drainage was designed for this. Infilling, vegetation growth and tree root ingress are major causes of watercourse deterioration. Though tree retention is important, this must be balanced with the need for effective drainage. WSCC Op Watershed funding has been used in Oving Parish and continues to be available, but private landowners also need to do their part. Of particular importance is the flooding of Church Lane arising from



water backing up from the North end of the Oving Rife's Eastern arm. Photographs of this flooding would be essential evidence to support the case for works to address this issue.

CDC's Local Plan Review is showing just how complicated and inter-related our modern society has become. Though CDC is responsible for Local Development Planning to meet Government targets, it is not an infrastructure delivery Authority. It relies on evidence from other bodies (e.g. the Environment Agency (EA), National Highways (NH) and WSCC) to get its Plan in a position which is likely to get it through Planning Inspectorate Examination and developer challenge.

The main issue that has prolonged this process is the (NH controlled) A27 Chichester by-pass. Southern Water is statutorily required to deliver the sewage infrastructure (subject to EA Permits) to serve new development. NH though requires Local Planning Authorities to come up with schemes of mitigation for their Local Plan and find the funding for NH to then deliver. In CDC's case, it can't procure sufficient funds and hence an iterative process is underway to identify a level and pace of development which can be achieved/funded without unacceptable safety and congestion impacts. This is a separate process to NH's Roads Investment Strategy programme, the funds for which are at the Government's discretion.

CONSULTATION PROPOSAL FOR SPEED AND WEIGHT REDUCTION IN AND AROUND OVING


Oving Parish Council are asking for your support through this consultation to apply for aTraffic Regulation Order to reduce the existing speed limits on the following roads.

A:- Tangmere Road.

To move the existing 40mph sign, in both directions, close to the Drayton Lane junction with the Tangmere Road, eastward to the boundary sign of Tangmere Parish. We feel thiswould be a lot safer for the residents of The Kestrels, and the Littlemead Industrial area.

B:- New Road Oving.

To change the existing National Speed Limit to 40 mph, in both directions, from the junction with Drayton Lane, by the level crossing, eastward to Oving Village. This will slow down the traffic approaching the Village enabling drivers to adhere to the 30 mph limit along the narrow lengths of the High Street.



C:-Church Lane, Oving.

To move the existing 30mph sign, in both directions, close to the junction of Church Laneand Gribble Lane, eastward to the area adjacent to the Tangmere Bridle Way. As this is a single track road with no pavements, pedestrians have to walk in the road with pushchairs and dogs. When travelling from the east at 60 mph the approach to this section is obscureddue to the bend in the road. We strongly feel that to get the speed reduced will hopefully prevent injuries and save lives.

The Parish Council are also looking to get grants for the installation of gates at these pointsto make drivers aware of the change of speed limits. Also due to the increase of heavy vehicles passing through the village we are applying for a weight limit of 7.5 tons to matchTangmere Village. This would be from the junction of Drayton Lane through to Woodhorn Lane. There would of course be an exemption for access.

We are hoping you are in agreement with these proposals and to get them in place beforethe developments in and around our Parish increases the amount of vehicle movements.

NO TIME TO DIE directed by Cary Fukunaga.

Ahh Mr Bond, we have been expecting you... actually, we have been hanging around stroking the cat and trying to keep the sharks hungry for almost 18months... but here you are at last... worth the wait?

We find a retired 007 living the quiet life in Jamaica with his girlfriend, Madeleine (Lea Seydoux). Not for much longer though, as he is contacted by his old friend Felix from the CIA to assist it in the recovery of a kidnapped scientist. After initially refusing, an event happens which changes his mind and he is whisked off to Cuba.

His co-operative there is Paloma (Ana de Armas) If you saw "Knives Out" she played the nurse.... who whisks James off to a cocktail party where they are supposed to retrieve the scientist. She wears the most amazingly minimal dress which I have to say a well done to the designer, as during the inevitable shoot out with the baddies, never moves an inch! It is a brilliantly choreographed scene and introduces us to the real purpose of Bond's mission.

Not only has the scientist been kidnapped, but also his biowarfare virus, code named Hercules. At the party it is released, but being genetically altered only affects certain of the attendees.... namely members of Spectre.... keep up at the back.... these are the baddies from the last film. Their boss, Blofeld (Christoph Waltz) is still languishing in a UK high security facility channelling his inner Hannibal Lecter. He too goes the way of the other spectre members.

This of course brings Bond to London and MI6. M (Ralph Fiennes) is not pleased to see him, and Bond is not pleased to meet the new 007, played by Lashana Lynch. There is some very funny banter between the 007's and of course enmity turns to friendship in the end. Fortunately, Moneypenny and Q are on hand to assist him, and he learns that the Hercules programme was a MI6 project which has been hijacked by yet another set of baddies led by Safin (Rami Malek).

Still with me?

Now it is a joint MI6 and CIA race against time to stop the virus been released worldwide, and of course off to a secluded island to do it. Very Thunderbirds are go!

This is Daniel Craig's 5th and last outing as James Bond, and it does him proud. The film delivers big stunts, big laughs, amazing set pieces and special effects. It is also a slightly softer, 21st Century Bond, dare one say he has connected with his feminine side (with Phoebe Waller Bridge on the writing team there had to be a hint of the hot priest!)

HURRAH! FOR HISTORY Chichester Local History Society by David Storey

An exciting time, with Lockdown hopefully gone for good! A wonderful opportunity to get out and socialize, make new friends and take up new activities. One such opportunity would certainly be joining the Chichester Local History Society. Only qualification required? Just enthusiasm to learn more about the fascinating history of this unique area we are privileged to live in.

Meetings are second Wednesday each month in the historic New Park Centre in the friendliest and most informal atmosphere. We members are fortunate indeed to enjoy the variety of talks, often by experts in their field, organized by our hugely enthusiastic committee members. Though Philip Robinson, Alan Green and Andrew Berriman would insist it is impossible not to be enthused by the wealth of local historical material, from humble hearth to royal connections.

Wealth of local historical material?

Well, did you know that Boxgrove Man, the oldest human remains ever found in Britain, might have been a woman? And that he/she was an expert butcher using precision stone tools 500,000 years ago and would have had rhinoceroses and bears trampling his/her bean patch?

Or that a Saxon fleet, built and assembled in Chichester Harbour, once sailed to the Thames and threatened London and regime change? Sadly the local Godwinson family had over reached itself and Harold's later sea trip from Bosham to France was to culminate in his death on the battlefield of Hastings.

Hardly any of our supposedly natural landscape has been unaffected by man over the millennia and we learned from the LiDAR High Woods project that the beautiful area of ancient woodland north west of Arundel was in fact intensively arably farmed in the late Stone Age! At the same time, well before the Roman invasion, local tribes were trading all over the Mediterranean and developing closer and closer ties to Rome.

Chichester Cathedral and Boxgrove Priory have been proclaimed the two most important Early English buildings in Sussex by the renowned architectural expert Nikolaus Pevsner, whilst in 1675 the world's first pack of fox hounds was formed at Charlton. And the world's oldest set of cricket rules were written locally, with copies kept in Goodwood House and Lords.

There is much to be learnt about the dozen airfields around Chichester which stood in the front line against the Hitler in 1940. But the Society also covers popular history; murders, shameful actions of civic dignitaries and the red light area, the colourful 900 year history of Sloe Fair and the impact of the Americans and other allies encamped locally in 1944.



BOOK CLUB REPORT

Our next two choices were both sad novels about young boys. "Hamnet" focuses on Shakespeare's son who had a twin sister Judith. When the story begins she is ill, but recovers only for her brother to then sicken and die. It is an undisputed fact that he died young (about nine years' old)., but little else, like much of Shakespeare's life in Stratford is actually known. Maggie O'Farrell paints an authentic, though fictional picture of Stratford and the family living there at the turn of the sixteenth century. Her background research is well detailed. The characters live and breath in the fictional setting, particularly Shakespeare's wife, Anne as girl, wife and mother. Shakespeare mourns his son, and the author suggests he wrote "Hamlet" to make amends for his negligence. This might well be so, but it is a debatable point.



"Shuggie Bain" won the Booker prize deservedly so. The writing by Douglas Stuart, is brilliant but but it related one of the saddest tales we have ever read. Shuggie (diminutive of Hugh), grows up in a Glasgow tenement at the time when the shipyards have fallen silent, the factories closed. So the men have no work, the women cope as best they can, often turning to drink as a solace. Shuggie's pretty mother Agnes follows this path, and her life is a slow, painful disintegration. her two elder children leave and Shuggie, bullied and misunderstood is her only support. Agnes manages a year off alcohol but succumbs through the misguided kindness of a man who wants to help her. From then on it is downhill all the way. Shuggie watches his mother die, what else can he do? This story goes straight to one's heart, you so hope there will be some light and happiness. There is a glimmer at the end when Shuggie, alone in the world, makes a friend of Leanne. Will they succeed together?

By contrast "Let's Do It", Victoria Wood's biography came next, a welcome relief. It is very detailed and comes alive if the reader can hear Victoria's distinct voice singing the songs, acting the sketches and comedies, delivering her "stand -up" lines. The real Victoria Wood was a shy person underneath, but a totally different personality appeared when performing. She was an absolute perfectionist, often drove fellow players mad, but they all acclaimed her genius. Part of that lay in choosing the perfect co-workers to perform with her.

"The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks" is not a novel. Henrietta was a poor, black American woman who dies aged 31 of cancer, leaving 6 children. Some of her stem cells were taken (illegally?) and proved incredibly good at reproducing themselves, acting as hosts for other culture cells. In fact they have gone all round the world, and are still helping in so much research. Rebecca Skloot heard a brief mention of her when a student, and later followed up all the evidence she could find, interviewing Henrietta's family often with difficulty. They knew nothing until these revelations, were never rewarded in any way, not even with Medicare. 



The last two years at Tangmere Military Aviation Museum have been, as you might expect, quite hard. Closing early at the end of 2019, not opening until late in 2020, and then opening early in May 2021 – some three months late – was not good for the finances.

However, with our eyes over our shoulder looking at Boris and his team, we did open in May for just five days a week. A lot of staff were unable to come in due to health reasons, not Covid related. But by July we were open 7 days a week and welcoming increasing numbers of visitors.

2021 started on a bad foot when our Chairman, Group Captain David Baron OBE, passed away at Christmas. It was quite a blow for his family and for the Museum. David had put so much work into the Museum. His role has been taken on by Dudley Hooley and he will be the springboard for

us to continue move onwards and upwards.

During the closed down period, from the end of October 2020 until February 2021, a tremendous amount of work carried out in the Museum and a new shop opened. But the work never stops. Our Phantom, which is in the logbook of David Baron, is being repainted as a memorial to him. The aircraft is being transformed from the blue to 6 Squadron camouflage. The aircraft had been painted blue to recognise the 50th Anniversary of the formation of NATO. No longer. It is almost complete now in 6 Squadron colours.



And still to come – 2022, This year is rapidly fading. We have had a late celebration of the Battle of Britain 80 Anniversary, delayed by Covid, and since September our main exhibition has been about Speed.

75 years ago, September 7th, 1946 Teddy Donaldson flew his Gloster Meteor, now on show at the Museum, from Littlehampton to Bogner at an average speed of 616 miles an hour, breaking the World Speed Record,

And next year the Museum will celebrate its 40th Anniversary. There is plenty to look forward to in 2022 and I shall let you have more information in future editions.

Historic Flint Wall at the Burial Ground



A beautiful week in July witnessed a hive of activity in our Burial Ground as Carl Masters and his team embarked on the repairs to the historic flint wall.

Though most of the wall was in good shape, there were certain sections which were in drastic need of TLC as can be seen in the before and after photos. This work was funded through the wonderful generosity of many people in the village, a substantial grant from the Parish Council and a surprise gift from a builder in Chichester who, having recently demolished a wall, donated the flints.





Enormous thanks must go to Carl and his team and all those who contributed in so many ways to the success of this project – thanks to them the wall will now survive for another 200 years!
